New Hampshire Rail Trail Plan

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) is leading the preparation of a plan for state owned rail trails. The purpose of this plan is to ensure the preservation and integrity of these assets and to provide direction for future development. The scope of the plan was set by the state legislature and focuses on the following tasks:

WHAT'S HAPPENING NOW?

• Update of the State's rail corridor inventory and list of trail organizations.

Data Collection. Our project partners at the University of New Hampshire (UNH) are collecting data regarding spending associated with trail usage. This data collection will continue through the summer and fall.

WHAT'S NEXT?

Economic Analysis. Data collected by UNH will be used for modeling the economic impact of rail trails in New Hampshire.

Draft Plan. We anticipate a draft plan document to be available for review in Spring 2022. The project is anticipated to be complete in June 2022.

Analysis of the statewide economic impact of rail trails.

Recommend a tier system for prioritizing state

investments in rail trail projects.

• Definition of routine and structural maintenance,

identification of typical costs and allocation of maintenance responsibilities between state and local trail groups.

- Development of recommendations for a state funding mechanism to support rail trail projects.
 - Development of a template trail management agreement
- Identification of best practices tor acquiring insurance for volunteer trail management groups.
- Development of recommendations for ensuring the integrity of publicly owned rail trail corridors.
 - Provide a pamphlet at state information centers on the trail plan.

Development of the plan is being guided by an Advisory Stakeholders Committee which represents state agencies, regional planning commissions, trail users, municipalities, businesses, railroads and abutters. Stakeholder meeting notes are posted on the project web page (see below) and stakeholder meetings are open to the public.

From the Health Officers:

Welcome back to Randolph! This summer finds us in a very different position than last. While the virus that causes COVID-19 is still present, safe practices and a high vaccination rate in NH allow more flexibility for being together this summer.

There are still a few guidelines to maintain this good news:

- Due to the increased dangers of the Delta variant, CDC has recently updated its guidance regarding masks in that they have added a recommendation for fully vaccinated people to wear a mask in public indoor settings in areas of <u>substantial or high transmission</u>. While at this time Coös County is low, the surrounding counties are medium. Surrounding states have a mix of medium, moderate and high rates. We are in an area that enjoys a high number of tourists from all over, especially from the northeast area. (See https://covid.cdc.gov/covid-data-tracker/#county-view)
- Unvaccinated individuals should wear masks when in public to protect those who may have compromised immune systems and other unvaccinated people. If you are immunocompromised or routinely in contact with vulnerable people, consider wearing a mask when in crowds and unable to maintain physical distances.
- Continue to practice good hand hygiene using soap & water if available, hand sanitizer if not.
